

Newspaper Article Accessed Online

Use this format if you find a newspaper article while using library databases or while searching the web.

If the newspaper article is available on the web, but not found using a library database, do NOT include the database name.

Only use this format if the article is also published in the print edition of the newspaper. If the article is exclusive to the web, see the format and example for **Web Exclusive Article**.

If there are no page numbers for the article, put n. pag.

If the article is not printed on consecutive pages, include only the first page number and a plus sign (+).

Author's Name. "Title of Article." *Newspaper Title*

Date of Publication, edition: Inclusive pages.

Title of Database. Web. Date of Access.

Richardson, Lynda. "Minority Students Languish in Special Education System." *New York Times* 6 Apr. 1994, late ed.: A1+. *LexisNexis*. Web. 15 Aug. 2007.

Web Page

If there is no author, begin the reference with the document title.

If there is no date, put N.d.

If there is no sponsoring organization or publisher, put N.p.

Author's Name. "Title of Web Page." *Title of Web Site.*

Sponsoring Organization or Publisher, Date of Publication. Web. Date of Access.

Committee on Scholarly Editions. "Guidelines for Editors of Scholarly Editions." *Modern Language Association*. MLA, 25 Sept. 2007. Web. 15 May 2008.

Web Exclusive Article

Use this format for articles that have not been published in a print edition of a book, magazine, or newspaper.

If it is a web exclusive journal article that includes a volume and/or edition number, cite the article as a **Journal Article Accessed Online**.

If there is no date, put N.d.

If there is no sponsoring organization or publisher, put N.p.

Author's Name. "Title of Article." *Title of Web Site.*

Sponsoring Organization or Publisher, Date of Publication. Web. Date of Access.

Tyre, Peg. "Standardized Tests in College?" *Newsweek*. *Newsweek*, 16 Nov. 2007. Web. 15 May 2008.

Online Video Clip

If there is no date, put N.d.

Title. Dir. Director/Creator's Name. Perf. Performers' Names (if relevant). Distributor's Name (if relevant), Date of release. *Name of Web Site.* Web. Date of access.

Legalize It. Dir. Carol Ann Ackerman. 19 Apr. 2007. *YouTube*. Web. 17 May 2007.

Personal Interview

Name of Person Interviewed. Personal interview. Date of interview.

Pei, I. M. Personal interview. 22 July 1993.

Documenting Sources in Your Paper

Citing sources in the body of the paper

Cite documents by putting the author's last name and the page number in parentheses. Do not separate the information with a comma.

Examples:

Single Author

(Hallin 5)

Two or Three Authors

(Rabkin, Greenberg, and Olander vii)

Four or More Authors

(Lauter et al. 2601-09)

Author's Name in Sentence

Tannen has argued this point (178-85)...

Source with No Page Numbers

It is best to cite sources with no author in your sentence rather than in parentheses.

Fukuyama's *Our Posthuman Future* includes many examples of this trend.

Source with No Author

If there is no author, use a shortened version of the source title in quotation marks. Start with the first word of the title (exclude A, An, and The).

International espionage was as prevalent as ever in the 1990s ("Decade").

Works Cited List at the end of the paper

Only include materials that have been cited in the text of the paper. Organize the references alphabetically by the first author's last name, start each entry with a hanging indent, and use double spacing.

Example:

Cascardi, Anthony J. *Ideologies in the Spanish Golden Age*. University Park: Pennsylvania State UP, 1997. *Penn State Romance Studies*. Web. 12 Mar. 2007.

Franke, Damon. *Modern Heresies: British Literary History, 1883-1924*. Columbus: Ohio State UP, 2008. Print.

Information for the Works Cited List

Include all information necessary for someone else to find the same resource.

Print Book

Author's Name. Title of Book. Place of Publication: Publisher, Year of Publication. Print.

Franke, Damon. *Modern Heresies: British Literary History, 1883-1924*. Columbus: Ohio State UP, 2008. Print.

Book Accessed Online

Author's Name. Title of Book. Place of Publication: Publisher, Year of Publication. Title of Database/ Web Site. Web. Date of Access.

Cascardi, Anthony J. *Ideologies of History in the Spanish Golden Age*. University Park: Pennsylvania State UP, 1997. *Penn State Romance Studies*. Web. 12 Mar. 2007.

Print Anthology

Editor's Name, ed. Title of Anthology. Place of Publication: Publisher, Year of Publication. Print.

Shell, Marc, ed. *American Babel: Literatures of the United States from Abnaki to Zuni*. Cambridge: Harvard UP, 2002. Print.

Anthology Accessed Online

Editor's Name, ed. Title of Anthology. Place of Publication: Publisher, Year of Publication. Title of Database/Web Site. Web. Date of Access.

Child, L. Maria, ed. *The Freedmen's Book*. Boston, 1866. *Google Book Search*. Web. 15 May 2008.

Journal Article Accessed Online

Use this format if you find a journal article while using library databases or searching the web.

If the journal article is available on the web, but not found using a library database, do NOT include the database name.

If there are no page numbers for the article, put n. pag.

Author's Name. "Title of Article." Title of Journal Volume Number.Issue Number (Year of Publication): Inclusive Pages. Title of Database. Web. Date of Access.

Tolson, Nancy. "Making Books Available: The Role of Early Libraries in the Promotion of Children's Literature." *African American Review* 32.1 (1998): 9-16. *JSTOR*. Web. 5 June 2008.

Magazine Article Accessed Online

Use this format if you find a magazine article while using library database or while searching the web.

If the magazine article is available on the web, but not found using a library database, do NOT include the database name.

Only use this format if the article is also published in the print edition of the magazine. If the article is exclusive to the web, see the format and example for **Web Exclusive Article**.

If there are no page numbers for the article, put n. pag.

If the article is not printed on consecutive pages, include only the first page number and a plus sign (+).

Author's Name. "Title of Article." Magazine Title Date of Publication: Inclusive pages. Title of Database. Web. Date of Access.

France, Anatole. "Pour la Paix, pour la Liberté." *New Age* 5 Sept. 1907: 297-98. *The Modernist Journals Project*. Web. 5 June 2008.
