Documenting Sources In Your Paper

When writing your research paper, you will draw information from other sources and you will need to document these sources in your paper.

Reference List—p.175

To document your sources, you will include a list of the sources you used. This is known as a Reference List. This list appears at the end of your paper. This list is alphabetized by last name of authors.

Franklin, John Hope. 1985. *George Washington Williams: A biography*. Chicago: University of Chicago Press.

Weber, Bruce. 1985. The myth maker: The creative mind of novelist E. L. Doctorow. *New York Times Magazine*, 20 October, 42.

Parenthetical References—p.175

You will also acknowledge the sources within the text of your paper, usually through the use of a parenthetical reference in the Author-Date system. These references include author's name and year of publication. If you name the author in the text, use only the year of publication. You may need to include page numbers after the year of publication. "A parenthetical reference should be placed just before a mark of punctuation....If this placement is impractical, the reference should be inserted at a logical place in the sentence." (p 178)

Information Needed for the Reference List

You will need to include all of the information that will allow someone else to find the same resource. **HINT:** Give full name of authors. Capitalize the 1st word of the book title and article title along with any proper nouns and the first word of any subtitles within the book and article title. Capitalize all important words in the journal, magazine, and newspaper title.)

Book —p.187

Author. Year. Book title. Publication City: Publisher. (May also need editor, translator, compiler, edition, number of volumes, name of series).

Lynd, Robert, and Helen Lynd. 1929. *Middletown: A study in American culture*. New York: Harcourt, Brace and World.

Newspaper Article —p.204 & 181

“News items from daily papers are rarely listed separately in a bibliography or **reference list**. If a newspaper is cited only once or twice, a note or a **parenthetical reference** in the text is sufficient”—p.204

Parenthetical Reference: (Irish Daily Independent [Dublin], 16 June 1904).

Magazine Article —p.203 & 181

Article Author. Year. Article title. Magazine Title, Date, Pages.

Weber, Bruce. 1985. The myth maker: The creative mind of novelist E. L. Doctorow. *New York Times Magazine*, 20 October, 42.

Journal Article —p.202 & 181

Article Author. Year. Article title. Journal Title Volume Number, no. Issue Number: Pages. (May need season or month).

Jackson, Richard. 1979. Running down the up-escalator: Regional inequality in Papua New Guinea. *Australian Geographer* 14 (May): 175-84.

Smith, Lawrence P. 1993. Sailing close to the wind. *Politics in Action* 10, no. 4: 80-102.
