The Joint Advisory Committee on Educational Services to the Deaf (previously known as the H.B. 1880 Committee) is on the move. The members of the Committee are: Lt. Gov. W. P. Hobby as the Chairman, Speaker Bill Clayton as the Vice Chairman, Secretary of State Steve Oaks as the Secretary, Senator Chet Brooks, Representative Tim Von Dohlen, Mr. Larry Evans, Mr. Mack Harris, Mrs. Fran Herrington, Mr. James Houlihan, Mrs. Ann Phillips and Mr. Ralph White. The committee is divided into two subcommittees: namely the Subcommittee on Educational Programs chaired by Representative Tim Von Dohlen and the Subcommittee on Governmental Structure chaired by Senator Chet Brooks. As a newly hired Program Co-ordinator for the Committee, Ms. Kathy Williams will assist in all of the planning, research and organization of the Committee activities. On March 30, 1978 the Committee received testimonies from state agencies, departments and organizations providing educational services to the deaf, and then heard personal testimonies from many individuals, mostly from the Central Texas area in a 2-day session on April 20-21.

Future sessions will be held in various areas of Texas; tentative plans are:

August - McAllen and Houston

If time permits, more hearings will be scheduled in the summer, these are the opportunities for the deaf, parents of the deaf and professionals working with the deaf to testify on the Texas deaf education. All of the sessions will be open to the public. Interested persons are encouraged to attend as many sessions as possible and present their testimonies on their experiences in the deaf education. The Texas Commission for the Deaf has been invited to assist in spreading the announcements to the Texas public, especially the deaf community.

DEAF AWARENESS WEEK May 1-7, 1978

Governor Dolph Briscoe has signed an official Proclamation designating May 1-7, 1978 as Texas Deaf Awareness Week. This was done because the Texas Deaf Community continues to "make significant and lasting contributions to the state government and local municipalities". Further, the Governor wanted to draw to the attention of all citizens of our state the specific needs and noteworthy contributions of the Texas Deaf Community. Finally, the proclamation is aimed toward public awareness of the service available to the Texas Deaf Citizenry during the week of May 1-7, 1978.

In conjunction with the statewide deaf awareness week, the Texas Commission for the Deaf will have a daily open house for all deaf citizens, local deaf leaders and dignitaries, state government officials, and the general public. The open house will be in the TCD office at 3724 Jefferson, Suite 213, Austin, from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. during the week of May 1-5. There will be brochures and literature about TCD and deafness available for the public as well as an art gallery by Spectrum, Focus on Deaf Artists. The TCD staff will also demonstrate telecommunication equipment.

The TCD office has received notices of many deaf awareness activities occuring throughout 19 community-based service areas during this week. These community-based council outreach programs, such as Texarkana Area Services for the Hearing Impaired, Tarrant County Services for the Hearing Impaired, East Texas Deaf & Hearing Association, Southeast Texas Council for the Hearing Impaired and Central Texas Council for the Deaf, will be having booths about deafness at shopping centers, lectures on deafness and deaf awareness banquets.

TCD is pleased and proud to be a part of the deaf awareness festivities and congratulats the 19 Councils for their active support of the Governor's proclamation. These events will prove to maintain a lasting effect throughout the year as all Texas citizens become more aware of their deaf neighbors.

TCD SPONSORS WORKSHOP ON ELDERLY DEAF IN DEL RIO

A workshop on "Improving Services to the Hearing-Impaired Elderly Persons" was held in Del Rio, Texas on March 23. The Middle Rio Grande Office on Aging sponsored the workshop for approximately fifty service providers to the elderly and senior citizens. By invitation of the Office on Aging, TCD Executive Director, Carl Roberts and staff members Carol Lacey and Rebecca Haber brought the program. A Spanish interpreter assisted in translating portions of the program for the benefit of Spanish speaking participants.

The Governor's Committee on Aging and the 28 Area Agencies on Aging are sponsoring a conference on June 26-27, 1978, in San Antonio. The conference will be held in the San Antonio Convention Center, and will begin at 1:30 p.m. on June 26.

Governor Briscoe has stated that this conference "is <u>for</u> the elderly, not about them." There will be presentations by Governor and Mrs. Briscoe, as well as many exhibits, presentations, discussions led by senior citizens, and entertainment.

Texas Commission for the Deaf will be coordinating interpreters for the conference. Rebecca Haber, Field Consultant for Services to the Elderly Deaf, will be contacting all the Coordinators of Services to the Elderly Deaf (SEDCOS) to encourage attendance at this important conference. Ms. Elizabeth Criswell, Director of the Deaf Action Center, Dallas, will serve as interpreter for Governor and Mrs. Briscoe's presentations.

TCD IN ACTION

DCEPP: The Texas Commission for the Deaf was invited by Gallaudet College and the National Center for the Law and the Deaf to a workshop on "Deaf Consumer Education and Participation Pilot Project" in Overland, Kansas. As a representative of the TCD, Dr. Michael Moore participated in discussions on how deaf grassroots can be motivated to take up an active role in the community affairs and on how to encourage deaf persons to solve local consumer and other problems confronting them. In the near future, Dr. Moore will be setting up a small scale workshop in a Texas deaf community to put what he has learned into use. This will give the Commission an opportunity in gaining an experience in providing the local deaf people with the needed tools to become active and interested citizens.

ADARA: In the American Deafness and Rehabilitation Association Conference in San Antonio, the Commission for the Deaf presented a paper on the overall structure and activities of the Commission. As a result, a meeting of interested deaf leaders from several states met with this Commission for more information on TCD's status as an independent state agency. Personal visits to our offices were made by deaf individuals from New York and Minnesota. The Commission was further contacted by several states, such as North Carolina, Massachusetts, Wisconsin, Connecticut and Alabama.

HIGH SCHOOL VISITS: On March 14, 1978, a group of deaf high school from Corpus Christi visited our offices; the students learned about their Commission and State government. A brief lesson on how a bill becomes a law with some concrete examples was given. Mr. Don Kitson, the President of the Coastal Bend Council for the Deaf, Inc. and teacher of the class was responsible for arranging this visit.

TELEPHONE RATES: On March 15, 1978, an informal discussion between two representatives of the Public Utility Commission of Texas and the Austin deaf community was held in the TCD office in an attempt to call to the attention of the PUC the problems deaf TDD (telecommunication devices for the deaf) users experience as customers of Texas telephone companies. On June 2, 1978, at 1:30 p.m. Mr. George Cowden, Chairman of the Texas Public Utility Commission, will address the convention of the Parent Professional Section of Texas Association of the Deaf (PPS/TAD) which will be meeting at the Houston Astro Village in an effort to gain more insight on the telephone problems faced by persons who are deaf. With favorable legislation in Connecticut and California regarding the reduction of long distance telephone rates for the TDD users, we are hopeful that the Texas Public Utility Commission will recognize the problems of TDD users, and take similar action here in Texas.

INTERPRETING BILL: The Commission's Executive Director and Program Specialists met with Senator Lloyd Doggett who agreed to sponsor a new interpreting bill for the next Legislative Session. This new bill will be patterned after TSID's previously proposed interpreting bill and the new Virginia interpreting bill which was written with the assistance of the National Center for the Law and the Deaf. This bill will increase the protection of the deaf persons and interpreter rights.
