Students, alumni compete in 2000 Paralympics

UTA students and alumni represented the United States, Sweden, Australia and Mexico at the Paralympic Games, Oct. 18-29 in Sydney, Australia.

The Paralympics have been held every four years, just after the traditional Summer Games, since 1960.

In the 2000 Games, Randy Snow ('85) and Stephen Welch ('92) represented the United States in the tennis competition. Snow was eliminated in the third round, losing to eventual gold-medal winner David Hall of Australia. Welch advanced to the men's final against Hall, where he won the first set 7-6 (7-3) but lost the next two, 6-4, 6-2. Welch came home with a second silver medal, repeating his finish from the 1996 Atlanta Games.

Cezar Olivas ('99) played on the Mexican basketball team, which finished in 10th place. Enoch Ablorh ('00) played for the Swedish team, which finished seventh, and Brad Ness ('00) played for the Australians, who took fifth place.

Willie Hernandez ('94) joined current students Paul Schulte, a junior, and freshman Steven Tew on the bronze medal-winning U.S. basketball team. In the bronze medal game, Schulte hit a three-pointer from 24 feet in the final seconds to give the United States a 57-54 victory over Great Britain.

Schulte led team USA with 14 points in the game, which was played before more than 17,000, the largest crowd ever to attend a wheelchair basketball event.

The road to the bronze medal was sometimes difficult for the U.S. squad, which recorded four wins and a loss in the preliminary round, then defeated Australia in the quarterfinals in front of a partisan Aussie crowd. The Americans then lost to the eventual silver medal team, the Netherlands, in the semifinals.

Women win SLC cross country title

Led by second-place finisher Rebecca Johansson, the women's team won the Southland Conference Cross Country Championships last fall in Nacogdoches.

Johansson, a sophomore from Sweden, ran the 5,000-meter course in a personal-best 17 minutes, 52.8 seconds—17 seconds off the first-place time of McNeese State's Sita Waru. UTA's **Kajsa Haglund** finished fourth overall in 18 minutes, 12.89 seconds.

One of the keys to the team victory was the strong showing of the Lady Mavericks' third, fourth and fifth runners.

Melissa Corlett finished 12th,
Deborah McGowan 18th and
Camilla Dahlin 25th in the 75-runner field.

"Those three ran their best races of the year," said coach John Sauerhage. "We talked the week before about somebody stepping up and being a hero. Basically, every one of them responded with that type of effort."

The SLC title was the first for the women since 1997.

In the men's competition, UTA placed three runners in the top 10 but still finished second to McNeese State.

"These guys ran heroically," Sauerhage said. "We were one man away from sweeping. I'm optimistic that we can sweep the men's and women's titles next year."

Olympic career: Finished ninth in the 100-meter breaststroke for the United States at the 1976 Olympics in Montreal.

Most vivid Olympic memory: "It definitely would be walking into the stadium during the opening ceremonies. Being able to watch the two people run in and light the flame was very exciting."

In part-time duty, Hayes led the team to five national championships while also serving as director of UTA's Office for Students with Disabilities. Diane Hengst has replaced Hayes as director. . . . UTA TO HOST 2001 SLC MEET. UTA will host the 2001 Southland Conference Outdoor Track and Field Championships May 12-14 at Maverick Stadium. UTA last hosted the meet in 1992. The Lady Mavericks will be vying for their fourth consecutive SLC outdoor title.... WALKER SETS KILLS RECORD. Volleyball captain Trisha Walker set a school record for kills in a match with 35 against Lamar University last fall at Texas Hall. Walker, an outside hitter, broke the record of 34 set by Amber Pack in 1999 also against Lamar. Walker earned All-Southland Conference first-team honors last season....
