

# Handicapped's Campus Aid To Be Discussed Wednesday

Administrative bureaucracy, a disabling factor for the already handicapped student, will be the target of an open meeting Wednesday sponsored by the Handicapped Students Association. It will be in the student center Rose Room at 5:30 p.m.

Results of the discussion will be forwarded to Student Congress.

Handicapped students have problems that never occur to the non-handicapped. Some progress is being made to help minimize these difficulties.

Jim Hayes has authored a Student Congress resolution on facilities for handicapped students. The resolution passes Oct. 19.

Hayes included in his resolution that permanent signs be placed on campus elevators stating they are for those dependent on them.

Also included in Hayes' resolution:

-That necessary new ramps for connecting sidewalks, streets and buildings be constructed, leveled and maintained;

-That at least one bathroom stall in each restroom be widened to allow unrestricted passage of a wheelchair;

-That handicapped facilities at athletic events be enlarged and improved wherever difficulties exist for the handicapped spectator;

-That a committee composed of representatives from the Handicapped Students Association and Student Congress advise specific improvements.

An offshoot of the HSA's present activities is a program to inform handicapped high school students of what problems they will find in college and how to cope with them.

"We want to encourage them to enter college," said Dan Rodriguez, HSA president. "They must make up mentally for what they lack physically."

Rodriguez is compiling a slide presentation which will be made available to handicapped high school students.

The presentation's purpose is to let the college-bound student know what to expect, what the physical barriers will be

and what devices are available for help.

"The mental anxieties encountered in the transition from high school to college and those problems that arise while in college must be recognized," said Rodriguez.

"We must also try to promote self-evaluation on the part of the handicapped as to his goals and his means of attaining those goals."
