Seminar probes Chicano problems

Problems of Mexican-American students will be examined during a seminar of the Fort Worth-Dallas Chicano Conference on Higher Education

today and Saturday at Cooper Center.

The Graduate School of Social Work and the Association of Mexican-American Students will host community leaders, educators, administrators and students from area junior colleges and universities. The conference will focus on problems in education.

Al Soto, former president of AMAS, said specific problems are recruit-

ing new students and retaining ones already enrolled.

"This seminar will hopefully set the stage in establishing a program which will objectively identify major problems affecting Mexican-American students and propose possible solutions," he said. "We hope to discover how a student is approached — to enter a university — if he is approached — and what steps are taken to insure he will want to continue higher education."

The two-day conference will focus on three major problems areas: accessibility of junior colleges and universities, the admission of Chicano students to these schools and the retention rate of Mexican-Americans through graduation.

The conference will produce a report recording its findings and recom-

mendations.
