

## P resident's Letter

To: All CTD Members, Friends, and

Disability Rights Advocates

Re: Declaration of War

#### Greetings:

The staff of the Coalition of Texans with Disabilities, acting with vital and effective force continues to work toward the growth of CTD. Their efforts under the direction of Belinda Carlton, have been so effective that the remainder of the CTD membership appears to be unaware of the fact that CTD is presently engaged in the greatest battle of its existence. That is the battle for survival.

During the past year, the CTD Board of Trustees and the CTD staff have explored every avenue to obtain sustained funding for the many programs and projects that the CTD members indicated an interest in pursuing. To remain as independent as possible, we have declined to accept funding from sources that would limit our ability to take on issues that are often unpopular, but necessary to encourage and enable persons with disabilities to fully participate in all aspects of the social and economic life of the great State of Texas. This action alone has seriously impaired our ability to continue to operate as we have in the past.

As President, I am asking that you join with CTD officials in fighting this battle to ensure the survival of CTD. We urgently request your assistance in preventing the catastrophic closing of CTD operations by arming yourself and joining in the battle. A greater explanation will be given during the assembly.

In conclusion, I want you to know that our welcome to the 1st Annual Conference on Attendant Services and the 15th Annual CTD Delgates Assembly is both warm and heartfelt. It is the hope of the CTD Board and Staff that your visit to the City of Houston will be entertaining and enjoyable. We know that the friendships made here will grow and become enriched through the years. The deliberations made at this meeting will have a lasting effect on the lives of disabled Texans.



# CTD Past & Future

Assembly, CTD focused on the importance of united efforts to actively pursue compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. We brought in experts from across the nation to educate members on all titles of the ADA, and spoke of the ways we can achieve change starting at a local level. Without compliance, the ADA means nothing.

We began 1993 by raising funds to bring 25 disabled leaders from across the state to a three-day training on the ADA with trainers from the Disability Rights Education and Defense Fund. These leaders have provided trainings in San Antonio, Austin, Houston, Lubbock, Amarillo, the Valley, and El Paso. San Antonio and Austin are preparing for large ADA training in December.

This year's conference is entitled "Personal Attendant Services – The Key To Independence," and examines two current and controversial cross-disability issues: personal assistant services and current proposals to address the health care crisis.

The Personal Attendant Services Task Force played an active role in spurring local communities to take an active role in community based services issues in 1992. Outreach meetings have occurred in Amarillo, Houston, Dallas, the Valley, Austin, San Antonio and El Paso. Attendant services remain in jeopardy of budget cuts, and the PASTF anticipates one of the biggest fights in CTD's history for community-based service funding in the 1993 legislative session.

Another key to maximum independence is exercising our rights. With the Texas Disabiltiy Rights Network and the Personal Attendant Task Force Project, we have been able to more directly work with our membership to provide a vehicle for local and state action on pertinent issues.

The Texas Disability Rights Network made a focused effort in one community in 1992 using an organizing model which has achieved recognized power for local communities. CTD community organizer, Laura Brown, has met with over 150 people with disabilties in San Antonio, and the network now has over 60 active members. Members selected their first issue in March: the denial of civil rights to detainees with disabilities at the Bexar County Jail. Specific accounts from deaf detainees revealed that they had not received interpreter services while held in the county jail. With help of CTD member organization Bexar County Deaf Council, we were successful in getting a directive to be issued at the jail, ordering staff in booking to adhere to federal law. We received the commitment of the new Sheriff Ralph Lopez, prior to his election, to rectify the remaining problems. We are now pursuing a city ordinance that would allow the police department to "deputize" people with disabilities to ticket violaters of accessible parking slots.

During the Delegates Assembly, we will carefully reflect on our past goals and future, and forge out a new strategic plan for CTD – to ensure another successful 15 years for CTD.

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

#### Benefits of Membership

Organizational CTD Members receive:

- the CTD newsletter and alerts on legislation, advocacy, workshops, and training issues (available on cassette, braille, or computer disk upon request),
- opportunity for input into the activities and decisions of a statewide disability organization through current Board members, becoming a Board and/or Committee member, and submission of resolutions to the Annual Convention and to the Board Meetings,
- voting rights on Board members and Resolutions at CTD's Annual Convention,
- listing in CTD's annual program book of member organizations across Texas.

#### **Organization Membership Classifications**

Consumer Member Organizations may be national, regional, state or local consumer organizations which have a governing body consisting of 51% or more people with physical, mental and/or sensory disabilities.

A consumer organization has activities and/or services which advance disabled persons and is a recognized, non-commercial Texas organization or enterprise.

State consumer organizations must meet one or more of the following criteria:

- chapter or offices in at least two Texas cities,
- regularly convened meetings in at least two Texas cities,
- significant statewide membership,
- regular activities which deal with statewide issues,
- chapter or office in Texas that serves a local or regional affiliate of a national organization.

Associate Member Organization may be a national, regional, state, local or student organization which satisfies all but the consumer governance qualification for a Consumer Member Organization.

Affiliate Member Organization may be a national, regional, state, local or student organization which wishes to support the work of the Coalition and does not meet the qualifications for a Consumer or Associate Member Organization.

Corporate Member/Individuals are any organizations and individuals who support the work of CTD and wish to become part of a movement dedicated to ensuring the opportunity for equal participation in society for all Texans with disabilities.

# Disabled Peoples' Bill of Rights & Declaration of Independence

We believe that all people should enjoy certain rights. Because people with disabilities have consistently been denied the right to fully participate in society as free and equal members, it is important to state and affirm these rights. All people should be able to enjoy these rights, regardless of race, creed, color, sex, religion, or disability.

- 1. The right to live independent, active and full lives.
- 2. The right to equipment, assistance, and support services necessary for full productivity, provided in a way that promotes diginity and independence.
- 3. The right to adequate income or wage, substantial enough to provide food, clothing, shelter, and other necessities of life.
- 4. The right to accessible, integrated, convenient, and affordable housing.
- 5. The right to quality physical and mental health care.
- 6. The right to training and employment without prejudice or stereotype.
- 7. The right to accessible transportation and freedom of movement.
- 8. The right to bear and adopt children and have a family.
- 9. The right to a free and appropriate public education.
- 10. The right to participate in and benefit from entertainment and education.
- The right of equal access to and use of all businesses, facilities, and activities in the community.
- 12. The right to communicate freely with all fellow citizens and those who provide services.
- 13. The right to a barrier free environment.
- 14. The right to legal representation and full protection of all legal rights.

- 15. The right to determine one's own future and make one's own life choices.
- 16. The right of full access to all voting processes.
