VOTING ACCESS INFORMATION NEEDED

DIRECTOR PERSONIFIES INDEPENDENT LIVING



John R. Weir, executive director of El Paso Opportunity Center for the Handicapped (EPOCH), passed away Saturday, July 6 in a local hospital. A memorial service will be held Friday July 19th at 11 a.m. in the Multipurpose Center for the Handicapped, 9031 Viscount. Contributions for the John R. Weir Transitional Living Center will be gratefully accepted. John Weir personified the independent living philosophy. Injured in a driving accident at age 16, Weir was a C-5 quadriplegic who used a motorized wheelchair.

Although rehabilitiation counselors told him he was too handicapped to attend college, Weir persisted and went on to earn a bachelor's degree in political science and education from Eastern Michigan University.

In 1976, Weir began work with the Washtenaw County Comprehensive Employment Training Program as a Vocational counselor. He was involved with the planning and founding of the Ann Arbor Center for Independent Living and wrote the initial grant proposals for the center. Weir later became the attendant care coordinator for the center.

As executive director of EPOCH, Weir was interested in seeing change. He believed that the most effective way to break architectural and attitudinal barriers was for disabled individuals to actively participate in their community. With the West Texas Association for the Handicapped, Weir advocated for improved and extended Handy-SCAT service. He was actively involved with the Mayor's Accessibility Task Force for Disabled El Pasoans, serving co-chairman of the transportation barriers subcommittee.

John Weir was a pioneer in the independent living movement. He summed up his philosophy in the following statement: "There's no tried road that tells disabled people how to live, how to succeed---it's all trial and error. With this opportunity for trying new ways comes the responsibility to make them work."

John Weir took this responsibility seriously and made his new ways work.

SOCIAL SECURITY EVALUATES CONTINUING DISABILITY ELIGIBILITY

Health and Human Services Secretary Margaret M. Heckler on April 29, 1985, proposed new regulations on review of continuing eligibility of individuals who receive Social Security and Supplemental Income Disability payments.

This is another giant corrective step which will make extensive changes in the review.

Generally, the new rules provide that once an individual is collecting disability payments, substantial evidence must be shown that medical improvement has occurred and that the person is able to work before SSA can determine that the individual is no longer eligible to receive payments.

These rules, the cornerstone of a new, revised review process, lay the groundwork for the administration of the disability program fairly, compassionately and on a uniform national basis", "Secretary Heckler said. "In designing these rules, we have carefully adhered to the intent of Congress that people not be taken off the rolls unless medical improvement has occured."

The new rules represent a response by the administration and Congress to concerns that the disability review requirements of the 1980 Social Security Disability Amendments resulted in unforeseen hardships to individuals whose benefits were terminated even though their conditions were unchanged. In September 1984, the Congress passed a comprehensive reform bill, the Social Security Disability Benefits Reform Act. The legislation included a number of provisions to improve the program and emphasize a personalized decision-making process in line with Secretary Heckler's earlier introduction of face-to-face interviews and evidentiary hearings. The medical improvement standard will provide maximum protection to the beneficiary whose continuing eligibility is under review. The new rules provide guidance on how to apply the standard and the several exceptions incorporated into the law.

The proposed review process ensures that the decision will be made on a neutral basis without encouraging any particular outcome or point of view by the decisionmaker. A decision that there has been improvement in a person's impairment must be demonstrated by a comparison of the prior and current evidence used in the original decision.

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City of Cleburne Loses the Fight Against Group Home

On Monday, July 1, 1985 the U.S. Supreme Court unanimously ruled that the City of Cleburne violated the rights of mentally retarded persons by preventing a group home from opening in a residential neighborhood. The decision said the zoning law, which required the home to get a special use permit, "appears to rest on an irrational prejudice against the mentally retarded."

The Court found the City's requirement of a special use permit for a group home of mentally retarded persons to be a violation of the Equal Protection Clause of the U.S. Constitution. Other groups such as fraternity houses, nursing homes and apartment houses exist in the same neighborhood without such a permit.

The Court applied the "rational basis test" to find the special use permit requirement unconstitutional. In doing so, the Court rejected the argument that a higher level of scrutiny is required, and so declined to classify mentally retarded persons as a "quasi-suspect" class. Quasi-suspect is the status afforded women under the Equal Protection Analysis.

As a result of the Supreme Court decision, the group home for 13 mentally retarded persons will be opening in Cleburne in the near future.



FROM THE STATE COMMISSION FOR THE BLIND:

Members of the United States Congress, both Senate and House, are now in the active process of finalizing an appropriations bill for fiscal year 1986.

Of particular importance this year to blind and visually impaired individuals is the increased attention being given to Part C of Title VII, Independent Living for Older Blind Individuals. At no time before has Congress been more receptive to at last funding this part of Title VII which has never been funded before. Money appropriated to this particular part of the Rehabilitation Act would enable the development of several independent living training programs across the country that would help prevent many older Americans from being placed prematurely and unnecessarily into nursing homes or other institutions. The individuals who would benefit from Part C fall through the cracks of every other service system.

If services to this population are of a concern to you also, you can contact members of Congress this week or next and express your sentiments.

The Challenge of Disability: Support For Parents, the third national Parent-to-Parent family support conference will be held in Seattle, Washington on October 4,5, and 6, 1985. The conference is sponsored by the King County Advocates for Retarded Citizens.

MEDICARE DOCTORS LISTED



Listings of physicians participating in the Medicare program have been completed for all 50 states. You may recall that last fall the Department of Health and Human Services, in an effort to contain rising medical costs, asked physicians to sign up voluntarily to accept Medicare assignment. That is, to accept as full payment the rates set as "fair and reasonable" by Medicare.

Some doctors declined, but numerous others decided to support the program and their enrollment provided the data now available. Every Social Security office now has the printed lists of these physicians. Interested persons can go to their Social Security office and copy the needed information.

But there is another, easier way to acquire the same information. You can write to Medicare Relations, P.O. Box 660331, Dallas, Tx. 75266-0031 and ask for the Medicare Participating Physicians and Suppliers Directory and send a \$2 check for each county's listing. Be sure to specify which county roll you want. Delivery is slow, but worth waiting for.

Letter to the Editor:

As a disabled Texan and citizen of this State for almost 40 years, I must say that I was appalled and outraged at the recent comments by our Texas Governor, Mark White. Governor White, June 7, 1985 was quoted by the Associated Press in an article in the El Paso Times as suggesting that mentally retarded persons, etc., wanting to live in group homes should locate in industrial areas should there be neighborhood resistance.

What kind of words are these coming from a supposed national figure and one who is the leader of this State? Does that also mean that if persons of different color or religion meets resistance in residential neighborhoods that they too should be re-located in industrial areas? I, for one, had hoped that this Governor of our State, yes even disabled people have a claim on Texas, would have a more enlightened attitude toward disabled people. Or does he believe that people who are trying to break out of institutions really have no place living next to 'nice, decent people? Such a mentality smacks of racism and discrimination and disabled people across the State should respond with outrage and anger at such outmoded, paternalistic attitudes.

Our representatives on the quote, "Governor's Committee for Disabled Persons" should either challenge such statements or resign! We cannot allow such statements to stand as it is the first step toward dilluting progress in attitude change toward rights of disabled people!!

Maybe we should advocate burying nuclear waste under the Governor's mansion? Did I really vote for White?
