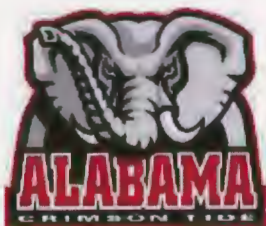

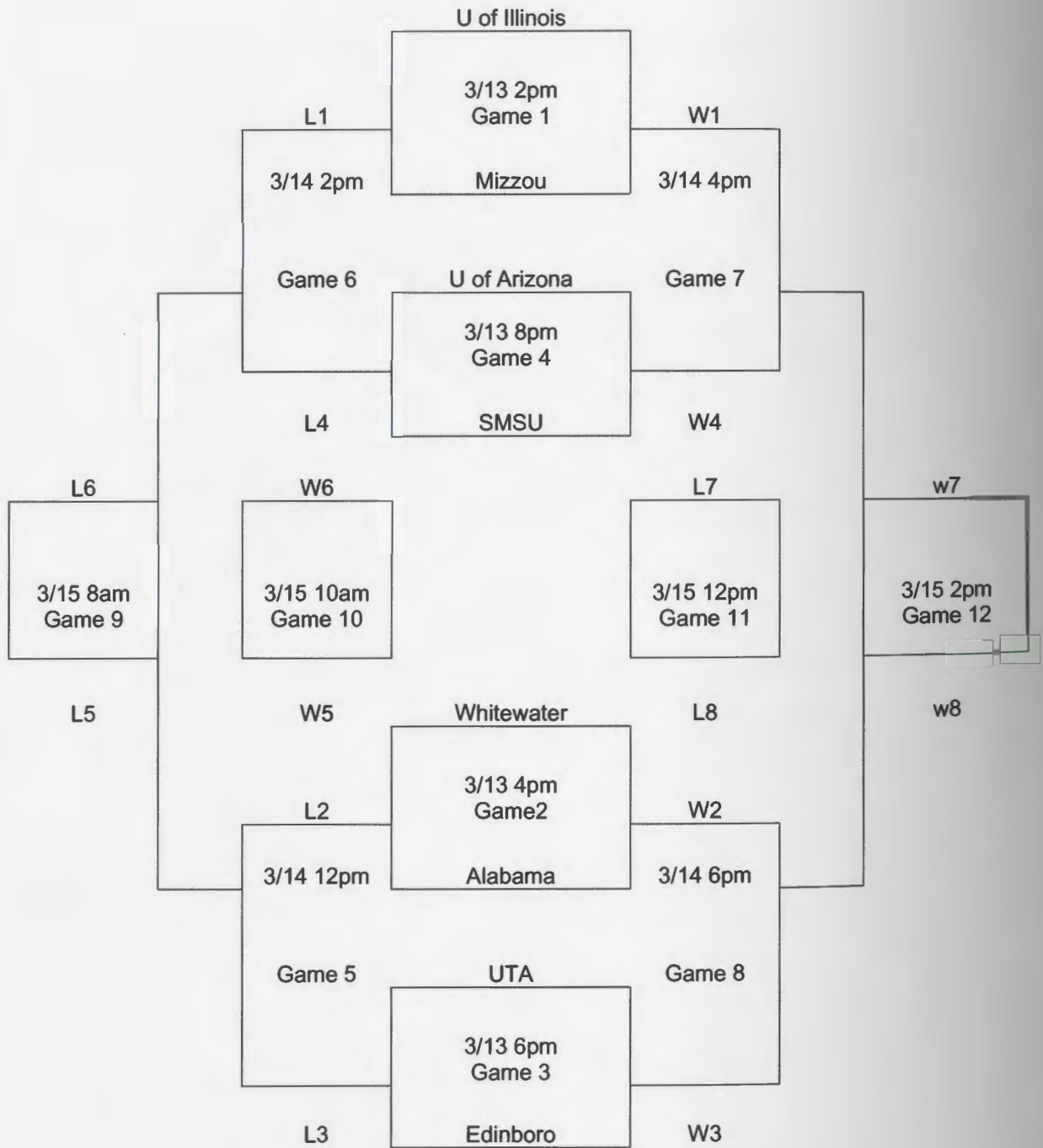

# 31st National Intercollegiate Wheelchair Basketball Tournament



## Welcome to Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, Oklahoma

Oklahoma State University is proud to host the 31<sup>st</sup> Annual National Intercollegiate Wheelchair Basketball Tournament. Oklahoma State University is Oklahoma's only university with a statewide presence. The OSU system is comprised of five campuses: OSU-Stillwater, OSU-Okmulgee, OSU-Oklahoma City, OSU-Tulsa, and the OSU Center for Health Sciences in Tulsa, which includes the OSU College of Osteopathic Medicine.


In 1998, OSU Students with disabilities began a petition drive to establish a sponsored OSU wheelchair basketball team and revitalize the Adaptive Sports club. The program initiative received endorsements from students, facility, staff, and administrators. Team members were recruited and OSU was accepted as a member of the Arkansas Valley Conference (AVC) for wheelchair basketball.

Colvin Recreation Center has received national recognition. The National Intramural and Recreational Sports Association (NIRSA), which represents almost every public and private college and university in the nation, named OSU's Colvin Recreation Center one of the top collegiate sports facilities in the nation. This is the facility where the first two rounds of the NIWBT will be played. The final round of the tournament will be played in historic Gallagher-Iba Arena, also known as the "ROWDIEST arena in the country!"

Gallagher-Iba Arena provides an up-close view from any seat in the house. Originally named Gallagher Hall after OSU fabled wrestling coach Ed Gallagher, the Board of Regents honored legendary Cowboy basketball coach Henry Iba when the arena was remodeled in 1987, and his name was added to the arena title.

For those visiting Stillwater, Oklahoma for the first time, we hope you enjoy your stay and take advantage of the local surroundings. Best wishes for a successful completion of your 2007-2008 basketball season.

NWBA is the model sport governing body—**we lead, we inspire, we win**

## ***The history books say...***

that there were a lot of guys who returned from the Second World War pretty well paralyzed and confined to wheelchairs for the rest of their lives. They were in the same bracket, had the same problems and frustrations, had the same unbridled and unchannelled energy. They had to find an outlet somewhere. Where better than in the red-blooded province of sports?

It started with such sports as ping-pong, catch and pool, then from bowling, swimming and volleyball to the more energetic water polo, softball, touch-football and basketball. While many other sports have been added since that time, it was basketball that within a few years far out shadowed the others in popularity.

While the California Chapter of Paralyzed Veterans of America has been popularly credited with the birth of wheelchair basketball, the New England Chapter of the same organization offered documentary evidence antedating the Californian claim to fame. Both will agree however, that it started sometime in 1946 in the Veterans Administration Hospitals. Thereafter, it spread across the nation to VA hospitals in Boston, Chicago, Memphis, Richmond and New York. Before long, the sport had spread across the border to Canada and across the ocean to England.

In April of 1949, a group of University of Illinois students, working under the inspired and tireless efforts of Tim Nugent, Director of Rehabilitation, formed the first National Wheelchair Basketball Tournament. That was the beginning of the sport as we know it today. The National Association, its 22 conferences and 165 teams are all directly related to the original plan made by the organizing group of disabled students under Tim's guidance. Tim continued to serve as Technical Advisor and Commissioner of the Association for 25 years, leading it through many stages of growth and development, until his retirement in 1973.

## Collegiate Division History

In 1970, twenty-one years after the National Wheelchair Basketball Association (NWBA) organized, Southwest State University (Minnesota) So. Illinois University, University of Wisconsin-Whitewater and the University of Illinois formed the Central Intercollegiate Conference (CIC). Their mission was simple-address the unique needs, interests and abilities of the student-athlete while maintaining active membership in the NWBA.

The NWBA crowned Southern Illinois University it's first Intercollegiate Champion at the first Intercollegiate Tournament in 1977 which was held at the University of Illinois. Five different schools-Southwest State (Mn), Wright State (Oh.)-The University of Texas at Arlington-The University of Illinois and the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, have since claimed the title of 'Champion.' By 1999 CIC development required the member institutions to re-organize as the NWBA Central Intercollegiate Division (CID) giving the Division more autonomy within the NWBA.



The NWBA-CID schools offer a distinct mix of academics and athletics. Daily in-season practices, full competitive schedules, weight training, off-season training, academic counseling and study sessions prepare the student-athlete for the rigors of life-balancing vocational responsibilities and vocational interests.

CID men & women have represented U.S. Paralympics & World Championship Gold Cup Teams.



## Wheelchair Basketball

### University of Alabama Wheelchair Athletics

The University of Alabama Wheelchair Athletics program was founded with a women's wheelchair basketball team in 2003 by Brent Hardin and Margaret Stran. The program has enjoyed the support of the Alabama Administration, Students and Faculty including UA President Robert Witt from the beginning and has grown quickly in just 4 short years.

The University of Alabama Crimson Tide men's team head into nationals as the newest team in the league after their second season in the intercollegiate conference of the National Wheelchair Basketball Association (NWBA). The Alabama men are a young squad comprised of all freshman and sophomores but have worked hard to compete against the older and more established teams and are just now realizing some of the fruits of their hard labor. Alabama is the only wheelchair athletics program in the Southeast United States and one of only three programs in the country that sponsors a men's and women's wheelchair basketball team. The Crimson Tide women compete in the women's division of the National Wheelchair Basketball Association (NWBA) and has finished in the top five national rankings the last three years and advanced to the final four in three of the last four years.

## Wheelchair Basketball

The University of Arizona's wheelchair basketball team has been competing since 1974. The team, originally a member of the Southern California Conference, became an independent member of the NWBA in 1986. The Wildcats are now coached by Derek Brown, and the team will be competing in the Central Intercollegiate Conference for the first time during the 2004-2005 season. The team practices 4 times per week, in addition to three day a week of strength and conditioning training at the Disability Resource's Jim Click's Adaptive Athletic Gym.

The Arizona Wildcats play an average of 30 games per season, tournament play is on a national level. Travel includes destinations such as: Oklahoma, Illinois, Texas, Nevada, and California. The Wildcats will also host home tournaments throughout the regular season. The University of Arizona's Adaptive Athletic program was mentioned in April 28th, 1997 issue of Sports Illustrated as one of the reasons the University of Arizona was rated #12 of the top overall Division I athletic programs in the country.

**Coach Erickson**

Erickson compiled a record of 193-133 during his tenure from 1998-2007. During his third season in 2000, he helped lead the Mustangs to a school record 33-8 record including a third place finish in at the National Intercollegiate Wheelchair Basketball Tournament. As head coach, Erickson led SMSU to six top four-place finishes in the NAIA College Division and coached 12 All-Americans.

An outstanding athlete, Erickson was inducted into the National Wheelchair Softball Hall of Fame in August of 2001, becoming the 26th individual to join the Hall of Fame. Erickson was the starting catcher on the St. Paul Rolling Thunder team that created a dynasty through the 1990's in wheelchair softball. The Rolling Thunder claim national titles in 1989, 1991-1996, 1998, 1999, and 2001. Erickson was a 10-time national champion in his 15-year career and was selected to the national all-tournament team five times.

The dedication to his players, Southwest State, and all of his contributions on and off the court with the sport of wheelchair basketball is recognized and will be carried on by everyone that was blessed to be touched by Coach Erickson.

## Wheelchair Basketball

## Wheelchair Basketball

Wheelchair Basketball began on the Edinboro University campus in 1980 as a recreation team that participated against other Edinboro student organizations, under the guidance of Dr. Jon Kron. The first team was named the Wild Wheelers and competed on campus until 1985. In 1985, athletes with disabilities organized on campus to form the Rolling Scots. Through 1995, this team competed primarily in the Keystone Conference and was only able to win one game in that period of time. In 1996, the Rolling Scots Basketball Team entered dual status as it started its first season as a Central Intercollegiate Conference member.

Edinboro began formal recruiting of athletes in 1998 and saw its first recruit arrive from Somerset, New Jersey. Jason Salawu played five years as a member of the wheelchair basketball team and was a captain in his last three years. While Edinboro recruits nationwide, it primarily focuses on the East Coast and has strong ties in the Philadelphia and New Jersey markets.

In 2001, Edinboro University administrators felt compelled to place the Rolling Scots basketball team into the Athletic Department, and named Jim Glatch as their first full-time head coach. As Coordinator of Recreational Activities for Students with Disabilities, Glatch had coached all of the sports programs and oversaw the Adapted Intramural and Recreational Sports Program (AIRS) since 1995. With the move into the athletic department came a change in name and status to the Fighting Scots as a varsity sport.

Edinboro started a junior basketball camp in 2001 on campus with 16 participants, and in 2002 worked with the Carousel House in Philadelphia to start a junior camp in that area. Both camps continue, primarily focusing on instruction of the game of wheelchair basketball and to educate potential student athletes on opportunities after High school.

Edinboro plays all over the country in intercollegiate and non-intercollegiate tournaments. In the 2002-03 season the Edinboro Fighting Scots finished the season ranked 12th in the nation in Men's Division 2 and 5th in the Intercollegiate Conference. The 2003/2004 season marked the first season that the college teams played as a separate division. Edinboro finished the season ranked fourth in the Intercollegiate Division with an upset over then 4th-ranked Southwest State University on their home court. Edinboro went into the 2004/2005 season with high hopes. At season's end, the Scots again went up one more notch on the ladder finishing 3<sup>rd</sup> in the nation with a 55-49 win over the University of Illinois. The team also finished with the most wins in school history with 25. 2005/2006 was another successful season, with the team finishing 4<sup>th</sup> in the Nation. Their overall record of 19-15 doesn't do the team justice as it played the toughest schedule it has ever had. The 2006/2007 Campaign was a very exciting season with the team finishing with a 24-9 season record. The 2006/2007 team hosted college nationals and gave the home crowd something to be proud of making it to the National Championship Game for the first time in team history. The final score was a 70 - 59 loss to Wisconsin Whitewater, but the 2<sup>nd</sup> place finish capped off a great season. Currently, Edinboro is the only team in Pennsylvania participating in the Intercollegiate Division. Rules of the Division are the same as those of their able body counterparts, except that players have five years of eligibility and can participate all five years.

**Wheelchair Basketball**

The Warhawk Wheelchair Basketball Team had its inaugural season more than 30 years ago competing as a member of the Lake Michigan Conference. The University of Wisconsin - Whitewater participated in the first National Intercollegiate Wheelchair Basketball Tournament (NIWBT) and was a founding member of the Central Intercollegiate Conference (CIC). The Warhawks have won the NIWBT seven times, the most recent victories in – 2003, 2004, 2005, and 2007.

Current Warhawk players, coaches and alumni have made significant contributions to wheelchair basketball on the national and international levels representing a number of different countries at various Paralympic and World Championship competitions since 1984.

Service for students who happen to have disabilities has been available on the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater campus for more than 30 years. Serving nearly 500 students, many of whom have severe and multiple impairments, the UWW campus budget commitment exceeds \$1 million annually. Students are served directly by a multi-disciplinary professional staff of eleven, and more than 300 part-time student workers are hired each year.

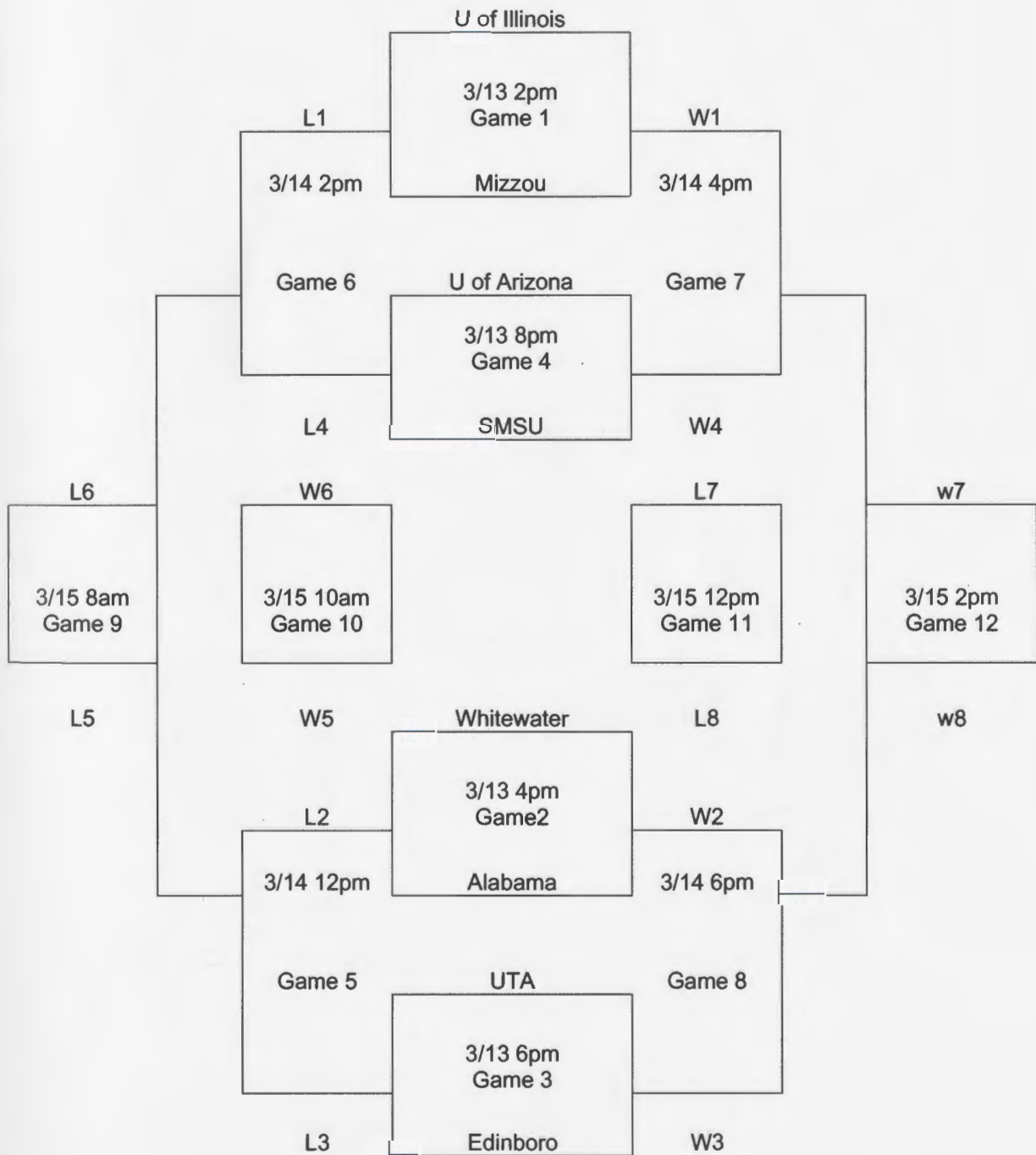
